

Improved connectivity for remote parts of Shire



Jock Graham and Pat Kelleher from Wi-Sky met with Council General Manager Colleen Worthy last year to discuss their plans for expanding the company's fixed wireless network into the Upper Lachlan Shire.

The Upper Lachlan Shire will soon have access to a level of digital connectivity often unavailable for people living in rural and remote areas.

Recently announced improvements to local telecommunications come as a result of the Federal Government's Regional Connectivity Program (RCP).

The \$90 million program is delivering 81 place-based digital connectivity solutions in regional Australia through a range of mobile and broadband services.

Federal Member for Hume Angus Taylor recently announced the project's details in the Upper Lachlan local government area, which will boost connectivity by providing high-speed broadband to homes and businesses.

"The fixed wireless network in Upper Lachlan will consist of 43 low impact interlinked 'poles' to provide high-speed broadband services, using an innovative, low-cost and disaster-resilient design suited to local conditions," Mr Taylor said.

"I'm thrilled that residents and businesses in Upper Lachlan will enjoy the benefits and opportunities that improved digital connectivity brings.

"The project, provided by Wi-Sky NSW, will allow people in this region who in the past have had very poor connectivity with access to improved broadband services and data packages."

The Federal Government is contributing \$90.3 million to the RCP, generating total new investment of more than \$180 million through co-contributions from funding recipients, state and territory

governments and other third parties, such as local governments, regional businesses and community development organisations.

The program is a key component of the Government's response to the 2018 Regional Telecommunications Review. The delivery of successful projects under the program will begin in the coming weeks, with projects expected to be completed by June 2022.

The Rollout

The first step for Wi-Sky will be to install a hub at a prominent site in Crookwell which will communicate to the other poles installed across the Shire.

Representatives from Wi-Sky, Jock Graham and Pat Kelleher, first met with ULSC General Manager Colleen Worthy in 2020 to discuss what their technology could offer to the region.

"I think I was initially struck by the significantly lower costs of installing fixed wireless access as opposed to the extension of full mobile services," Mrs Worthy said.

"From the information I've looked at, fixed wireless providers like Wi-Sky, and there are others out there so I don't want to spruik for any particular company, can provide faster services than satellite systems with fewer limitations.

"In these times, the ability to have a similar digital lifestyle in rural areas as you would have in a metropolitan area, including everything from streaming video services to all aspects of conducting a modern business, is crucial.

"It not only improves the quality of life for people already living and working here but also makes us

more attractive to potential future residents or businesses interested in moving here."

Wi-Sky Managing Director, Jock Graham, said that the three core advantages he believes Wi-Sky's fixed wireless service offers over satellites services were access to unlimited data, fast synchronous upload and download speeds and significantly lower latency than satellite services.

"One of the main complaints I often hear from users of satellite services is that they experience very poor latency speeds," Mr Graham said.

"We typically come in 20 times faster than satellite. We also offer a range of upload and download speeds at different pricepoints so for anyone who is interested, we recommend they look at the plans on the Wi-Sky website and see if there's something there that interests them."

Expressions of Interest

Before the rollout gets under way in earnest, Wi-Sky is interested in hearing from interested potential customers to assist them in prioritising the placement of their poles.

"To begin with, what we need are expressions of interest from people interested in taking up one of our plans," Mr Graham said.

"As we identify communities of interest, it will help us prioritise the placement of poles and proceed with the rollout."

Mandatory changes to lodging a Development Application

The NSW Government passed amendments to the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, which will require planning applications to be lodged with Council's through the NSW Planning Portal.

As a result of these changes Council is reviewing and proposing a number of upgrades to our planning application processes in the coming months to improve the customer experience.

As of the 1 July 2021, these State Government changes will require customers to submit all planning applications with Council online utilising the NSW Government Planning Portal.

Council will not be able to accept planning applications over the counter or the post.

These changes provide an exciting new era for planning across NSW, with the Planning Portal providing an easily accessible, user-friendly and transparent system for lodging planning applications.

From 1 July 2021 customers are required to use the Portal to lodge the full range of planning applications, including:

- Development applications (DAs) including modifications;
- Complying development certificates (CDCs);
- Construction Certificates (CCs);
- Occupation Certificates; and
- Section 68 applications.

It is recognised that some customers may find the required changes challenging, so Council is training staff to provide the necessary support to help with the transition.

As part of the transition Council is also integrating its technical planning systems with the Planning Portal, so once an application is submitted to the Portal it will automatically appear in Council's systems.

Council is also investigating electronic opportunities for its assessment, determination and inspection processes with an overall aim of providing an improved service for the customer with respect to the development application process.

From the Mayor's Desk

Representatives from Council's Planning Department have been very active over recent weeks, hosting meetings across the Shire to develop Character statements as it relates to our larger villages.



Local residents were invited to these meetings to develop further community involvement in determining what is needed as our Shire and our unique villages meet today's challenges and perceived needs into the future.

These Character statements follow-on from work already done with regards to our Strategic Planning Statements and any review of our LEP going forward.

It goes without saying that change is ongoing and constant. For many of our village residents, that change is welcome and they look forward to growing their residential base and commercial areas. Some are not so keen.

The overwhelming sentiment however is that we do not lose the character and village atmosphere that is so valued by our residents and the ever-increasing number of visitors we are seeing.

On the issue of residents and visitors, it should be remembered that approximately 45% of our ratepayers have their primary address outside of the Shire.

These ratepayers contribute massively to our economy. Many of the old buildings that have been restored throughout the Shire have been due to the enthusiasm and interest shown by the these ratepayers.

Next step in developing Character statements is a summary of information gathered to date which will be taken back to Round 2 Community meetings.

Look for the upcoming dates and take the opportunity to attend those meetings.

This is a great Shire with great villages and rural areas. Make sure you have your say on where we are at now and where we need to be.

From the GM's Desk

The last three months have been an eventful and busy time for Council. One significant item this month was achieving the funding for Crookwell's new outdoor pool from LCRI Federal Funding, thanks to support from our Federal Member Mr Angus Taylor who fully appreciates the need for pools in regional areas.



The Pool Complex will be delivered in phases and so the task remains to secure funding for the other phases. However the first stage has received funding, and that means a safer and more cost-efficient outdoor pool is on target for this summer.

Another milestone is the finalising of the restructure process that began before I started here and that will be completed and in place for 1 July. The restructure included several different functions. One part was the process to align staff in logical work groupings, another was to provide a career path for staff within those groups. As a result, some teams will now be part of a different work unit.

Another part of the process was to ensure gradings and pay rates were equitable and consistent across the Council, or in other words, making sure people doing similar types of work were paid and graded consistently and fairly. The process made use of the industry-leading and highly-regarded OO-Soft software, with ongoing engagement and input from the union. It has been a lengthy process but good foundations and accuracy take time.

A by-product of this process has been that three new Managerial positions have been identified. Two of these were existing jobs that were found to require an upgrade, and the third, an IT Manager, will incorporate greater use of Geographic Information Systems that will significantly improve our ability to deliver a range of services efficiently and in a timely manner.

These internal process such as the restructure have all happened at the same time as we secured pool funding to reopen Crookwell Pool or as we seek financial support to secure Taralga's future water supply or as we manage to complete millions of dollars of road works again this year.

Council continues to work diligently for the community and as a result of the restructure, I know that Council is better equipped to deliver services for the people of the Upper Lachlan Shire.

PUBLIC NOTICE: Planning Application Fees & Charges

The Upper Lachlan Shire Council resolved at its meeting of 20 May 2021 to exhibit new fees and charges associated with the lodgement of certain planning applications via the NSW Planning Portal.

The fees will be reported to Council Ordinary Meeting on 17 June 2021 for adoption and implementation on 1 July 2021.

The NSW State Government recently amended the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000 to introduce a range of nominal fees for certain planning applications, certificates and payments that are to be paid by the applicant as part of the digital application process on the NSW Planning Portal.

These fees are different to the lodgement and assessment fees charged by councils and private certifiers.

They have been introduced to support the ongoing maintenance and delivery of the NSW Planning Portal and the related ePlanning Digital Services.
